All this is possible because the members of Shady Oaks Camp are united in a common purpose: To enrich the lives of their children by creating an environment where they can enjoy outdoor activities, shared friendships and the discovery of new interests.

Shady Oaks Camp for People with Disabilities is dedicated to the welfare of individuals with all disabilities. It is an inter-racial, non-denominational, charitable not-for-profit 501c3 organization chartered by the State of Illinois in 1942.

New members to Shady Oaks Camp are the guarantee of a continuing future to our camp program. Just as each child differs from all others, each member has a different talent and ability that is a valuable asset to the camp family. Members can become involved in the overall operations of Shady Oaks Camp by serving as an officer, board member, or committee chairperson.

To be a member of Shady Oaks Camp, dues of \$50.00 must be paid between September 1st and December 31st. After December 31st, dues are \$100. Dues must be paid in order to hold an office, serve on the Board of Directors or to send a child to camp.

In order for a child to attend camp, minimum requirements must be met.

Requirements for 2020 are:

- Attend a minimum of 4 member meetings a year
- Sell 10 or more tickets to major raffles held each year
- Volunteer a minimum of 10 hours per year on various fundraisers
- Buy/Sell a minimum of 2 tickets to Annual Dinner Dance
- For every dollar brought in, by selling raffle tickets to a major raffle or by purchasing tickets for our annual dinner dance or any qualifying fundraiser, 50% goes towards reducing your camp fee.



About Shady Oaks Camp

Shady Oaks Camp provides outdoor fun and recreation for children and adults with disabilities. The camp, located 35 miles southwest of Chicago, was built specifically around the special needs of these campers.

Shady Oaks provides 8 weeks of **1:1** camping for male and female campers. Programs at the camp include planned recreation, games, arts & crafts and swimming. All are adapted to fit the needs of each individual camper.

At Shady Oaks, every summer since 1947, these campers enjoy 2 to 8 weeks of field trips, movies, swimming, campfires, song fests, handicrafts, talent shows, parties, and special adapted games.

In addition to in-camp activities, there are field trips to entertainment areas and cultural centers, enabling campers to join in the everyday activities of living in the mainstream of life. Field trips may include 4th of July local fireworks show, baseball games, museums, theatres, and other places of interest within the greater Chicago land area.



About the Facilities

The camp is nestled in a grove of oak trees, on a 30-acre site located Homer Glen, Illinois. From its inception in the late 1940s, the camp has grown from its three original buildings to six dorms, two staff houses, a large dining hall, director's quarters, a heated in-ground pool and a recreational center.

The recreation center, Ford Hall is the center of many activities. It is a haven for varied activities on rainy days, housing numerous books, games, a pool table, a piano and a TV.

Ford Hall is also where visiting groups would present entertainment for the campers. During the off-season, September through May, Ford Hall (along with the Dining Hall) is available for rental for retreats, picnics, etc. Rates vary so please call for pricing details and availability.



About the Campers

The campers are children and adults with disabilities; all of which are members of the Shady Oaks Family. The minimum age for attendance is five years. There is no maximum age for campers. We accept campers not only from Illinois, but from all over the United States and other countries. The Board of Directors and the Executive Director make the final decision on eligibility to attend camp. The level of disability ranges from minimal in some cases to severe and profound in others. Care is designed around the needs of each camper.



Who Runs the Camp?

Shady Oaks is operated by a large and capable staff. The Executive Director and assistants are responsible for the overall daily operation. The Staff consists of American college students as well as staff from a variety of countries from the six continents of the world. Counselors are college students majoring in special education or related areas. Counselors are directly responsible for the well being of the campers on a one-to-one basis.

Other important staff include:

- A Medication Manager, on duty 24 hours a day
- A Camp Director and Assistant Director
- A Pool Attendant and Activities Director
- A Cook who provides meals designed for the campers needs



Main Source of Income

Shady Oaks Camp relies on a variety of fundraisers and private donations to fund their operations. Shady Oaks does not receive any state or federal funding for their program.

Operating Expenses

The operation and maintenance of Shady Oaks Camp is over \$450,000.00 per year, with most of the expenses incurred during the eight-week camp period. The cost of improvements and maintenance on the buildings, water, electrical wiring and plumbing systems varies from year to year.

Staffing cost also tend to increase each year. That's due to the fact that to acquire the type of intelligent, dependable staff necessary for the happiness and well being of the campers, it is necessary that we offer a competitive salary.

Specific projects completed in the last 10yrs include:

- New Accessible Playground
- New Sensory Room
- Renovated Dorms 5, 6, 7, 9 and 13
- New computer lab and equipment



Points System

Members of Shady Oaks Camp raise points in order to qualify their child for attendance at camp. The number of points raised determines the length of the stay at Shady Oaks Camp.

Important Note: Shady Oaks Camp members receive no pay for their work, other than points earned for camp.

Activities to Earn Points

Donations: dollar for dollar if the camper is designated

Raffles: ½ for designated camper, ½ for general fund
Fundraisers outside camp sponsored event:

If run by parent, guardian, etc specifically for a child's camp attendance, 100% net proceeds will be given to campers account. If a fundraiser is planned that references raising money for Shady Oaks Camp only 50% of profit will be applied to child's camp time. **SCHOLARSHIPS MAY BE AVAILABLE**
